

What is Youth Fostering Change (YFC)?
YFC is a group of young people who have been involved with the child welfare/foster care system. YFC works with Juvenile Law Center to create a campaign that improves the lives of youth who have been in the system. Juvenile Law Center is the oldest non-profit, public interest law firm for children in the country.

What does YFC do?

Each year, Youth Advocates learn how the child welfare system works and, based on this information and their own experiences, create a project to improve the system. As part of their campaign, Youth Advocates present their experiences, opinions, and project to different child welfare officials and workers such as judges, lawyers, DHS workers, social workers, and policymakers to promote their ideas for change.

How often do Youth Advocates meet?
Youth Advocates meet for 2 hour
workshops once a week from October to
June and as needed. Youth Advocates
are required to attend and participate in
each session.

Yes! Youth are paid for each session and receive stipends for additional work. First year advocates are paid \$10.00 per hour. Each year advocates complete a year, they receive a raise.
